

The Irish Film Institute for art house cinema and coffee in its light filled foyer.

A brisk walk along the promenade at Dun Laoghaire with views of Dublin Bay and looking inland, the spreading suburbs with the Dublin mountains in the background.

The exquisite jewel-like Harry Clarke stained glass windows in Bewley's Café, Grafton Street...and in the Hugh Lane Gallery on Parnell Square.

National Museum of Ireland – Kildare Street Significant exhibits

The Ardagh Chalice

The Ardagh Hoard, best known for the Ardagh Chalice, is a collection of metalwork from the 8th and 9th centuries, found in 1868 and now in the National Museum of Ireland in Dublin. It consists of the chalice, a much plainer cup in copper-alloy, and four brooches. The Ardagh chalice ranks with the Book of Kells as one of the finest known works of Celtic art in general, and is thought to have been made in the 8th century AD. Elaborate brooches appear to have been worn by monastic clergy to close vestments in that particular period of history.

A Brief History of Ireland

First settlement

Dubh Linn: Black Pool – located at Dublin Castle where the river Poddle meets the river Liffey

837 AD: 1st record of Vikings in Dublin

Dublin city was part of an area called the Pale, a region fully under the control of the English after the Anglo-Norman invasion of the $12^{\rm th}$ century led by Henry II.

Dublin Castle was the administrative headquarters for the English and their Parliament was situated at College Green, opposite the main gates to Trinity College, in the present Bank of Ireland building.

Gardens and Parks worth visiting in Dublin

Iveagh Gardens

The Iveagh Gardens, a combination of English and French garden styles, located at the back of the National Concert Hall and very close to St. Stephens Green, were originally owned by the Guinness family and were the gardens of their Dublin townhouse (now the Department of Foreign Affairs). The Guinness family donated the gardens to the nation and now the rose garden, woodlands, rockeries, fountains, grand statues and waterfall can be enjoyed by all who spend time there. The gardens are ringed by high stone walls which make them feel like a secret place.


